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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Sonari Commerce College, located geographically at latitude 27.02N and longitude 95.02E in Sonari town, the district headquarter of Charaideo, was established on 10th August, 1991. It is one of the best known leading institutions of higher education and one and only higher institution of commerce education in the entire district. Basically affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Dibrugarh, Assam, and running presently two streams, Arts and Commerce in full swing, the institution, moreover, provides education of Higher Secondary course under Assam Higher Secondary Education Council. Considering the continuously showing better academic performance of both H.S. Course and Degree Programme and to comply with the growing need of Science Education in the district, the Government of Assam has granted the Science Stream of Degree Program in the college and the arrangement of it is progressing. In addition to these, the college introduces a Study Centre of Open and Distance Learning under Director of Open and Distance Learning (DODL), Dibrugarh University, covering the Bachelor's and Master's Degree programs of both Arts and Commerce from the Academic Session 2021-22 to fulfill the hope of achieving higher education of those learners who are unable to pursue it in a regular mode for various causes. Thus, the college is serving the society by providing the fruit of quality education to enlighten the life of people.

Vision

The College has its vision of encouraging value based education among the student community. It is very honestly accelerating its activities in the field of its primary motive with newer techniques and innovations to fulfill its vision keeping a motto: "??????? ??????? ??????? (Gyanam Manusashya Netram Tritiyam), a Sanskrit Sloka from Bhagawad Gita which says "Knowledge is the third eye of human being" since the college firmly believes in the power of knowledge on human being. By teaching the students of moral and practical value of education, the institution is improving their ability to judge the real and just. They are thereby trained to become skillfully able and productive and promising source of the nation.

Mission

The College has its noble mission to educate students with individual attention and thereby enable them to prepare with the perfect knowledge to serve in the society with a skilled and true inherent motive of a social cadre. It has been working hard in its mission very sincerely and leaving no stone unturned since the date of its inception keeping ahead a few noble aims like:

- ? To enhance all round personality development of the students through proper guidance to educate the students to acquire the qualities of leadership to encourage to develop creative power of the students.
- ? To train the students to incline to show good performance in their chosen profession.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The urban location of the college at Sonari town, the head quarter of Charaideo, a boarder district of Assam with Nagaland and Arunachal Pradesh is a good advantage. It is very much convenient for the students of these hilly boarder states. Moreover, it is surrounded by tea gardens from all sides and many students hail from there.
- The coeducation system with multiple streams has granted it a unique strength providing the students a good encouraging opportunity to taste the knowledge of different branches of education.
- It provides Wi-Fi facility to students and teachers within the college campus, smart classrooms facilitated by LCD projectors, laboratory, separate common rooms for boys and girls, installation of sanitary napkin machine in the girls' common room, paver blocked pavement, mini playground, cool and hot drinking water facility etc. for all time regular use.
- The academic performance of the college is its another strength producing innumerable first class and even university topper graduates in the final examinations conducted by the university where it is affiliated to. Many formerly students are serving at responsible positions under union and state governments while many others are self employed.
- Financial help to poor but meritorious students is available.
- It has an active NSS unit serving in the college campus as well the public places.
- It has got cycle shed, organic manure chambers, solar energy and water harvesting systems.
- It has ramp for convenience of physically challenged students.
- The college campus is made greenery by systematic plantation.
- It has an active Alumni Association and it takes part in developmental activities of the college.
- The college has a good social touch. Teachers and students take part in social activities.
- There is a congenial teacher student relationship.
- The computer lab is well equipped.
- The college is mainly run by electric power. In order to manage regular power supply in the college it has got one 25 Kb Power Generator and an Inverter. Moreover, there are three solar lights that minimize the consumption of electric power.

Institutional Weakness

o Lack of a sound college fund and limited financial grants from Government and other sectors have

barred in proper infrastructural development of the college.

- No autonomy in designing its curriculum considering the need of the students.
- Insufficient digital classroom.
- Limited seats in the departments having Speciality course and not having Speciality course in many other departments of Arts Stream.
- Late and conditional provincialization of most of the employees and dropping out of office staff of Commerce Stream from provincialization and not provincialization of the Arts Stream.
- Lack of gymnasium and college hostel.

Institutional Opportunity

- There is a very good scope of converting the college in to an ideal centre of Commerce and Arts education with inclusion of various technical, professional and vocational courses.
- Students can be trained up with various skills of handiworks and entrepreneurial opportunities.
- Selection of the college by the Government of Assam to introduce Science education of undergraduate level.
- Involving the public with various awareness programmes.

Institutional Challenge

- To manage with social institutions and government orders in completing the scheduled courses and holding the examinations in specific functions of the college in due time.
- Apart from normal duties the teachers and office employees need to perform duties in other offices and places from time to time that hamper the normal activities of the college.
- Running the Arts Stream from Higher Secondary to Degrees Course with full faculty and without any financial aid or building grant from the government and other agencies is a big challenge.
- To keep pace with the rapid change of the system of higher education.
- Involving the guardians in various activities of the college.
- Increasing enrollment in some departments.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college strictly follows the course curriculums designed by Dibrugarh University, Dibrugarh for Under Graduate (UG) course. Every academic year the college issues a college prospectus where the students can get all information of the college and its rules and regulations. For smooth running and timely completion of each curriculum, the college prepares class routine every year and allots the teachers their respective classes in the very beginning of the session. With the completion of the course a revision is done and students are invited to clear their doubts in additional classes. The college makes schedules of conducting two Sessional Examinations and various class tests. Moreover, Seminars and Group Discussions, Home Assignments, Project Works and viva voce exams are held as a part of Internal Assessment to evaluate performance of students on the basis of the academic calendar of Dibrugarh University. The college always tries to provide all necessary support to the faculty members so that the curriculum can be implemented timely and effectively for which they are very much concerned.

Being affiliated to Dibrugarh University, the college has a very limited scope to contribute to the designing and development of the course curriculum. There is a good environment of teaching various issues of current topics like women empowerment, human values and eco-system and sustainable development apart from syllabus. The Career Counseling Cell and the Women Cell of the college have been organizing programs on career development with collaboration of IQAC of the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

In the process of teaching-learning and evaluation the institution follows the academic calendar given by the Dibrugarh University to teach the under graduate students. The course curriculum is prepared by the university and the institution only executes it and tries to complete within the stipulated time frame. Besides creating a good environment for learning, the teachers make lesson plan of the topics considering the importance of the subject matter. Through deliberation of lecture, use of teaching-learning aids, classroom interaction, home assignment, group discussion, seminar, etc. the students are prepared with the course content. Moreover, it is made more informative, useful and most importantly attractive to the students by introducing internet and Wi-Fi facilities, LCD projector in the classroom, field study, socio-economic surveys, interdisciplinary lectures and talks with eminent persons etc. The evaluation of their understanding of subject matter is done in the college through two sessional examinations. The final and end semester examinations are evaluated externally as per direction of the university. It is mentionable that the college is a Micro Zone Evaluation Centre under Dibrugarh University to evaluate answer scripts of end semester examinations of other colleges.

Besides these, the students are entangled in some community works through the NSS Unit of the college, extracurricular activities such as quiz competition, extempore speech, debating competition, drawing competition, essay competition, publication of college magazine, wall magazine etc. to earn knowledge from sources other than curricular activities.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovations and Extension activities are very important for a higher education institution to attain its goal. The institution encourages the teachers to participate and present their research papers and projects in various seminars, workshops and conferences. The teachers are also always encouraged for research works to earn their Ph. D. and M. Phil Degrees and a few have attained their goal. Most of the teachers have contributed chapters and articles in edited journals and books.

The institution encourages for innovations and extension activities for expansion and exchange of knowledge. The activity of a college should not be confined within its campus only. So, the college organizes many extension activities in the neighboring areas while going to perform its social responsibility and ensures active participation of the students to make them conscious about the social issues and their duties to create a relationship between the institution and the neighboring community. The Teachers' Unit, NSS Unit, the Women Cell and Career Counseling Cell organized different programmes such as World Environment Day, National Voters' Day, International Yoga Day, International Women's Day, Teachers' Day, Librarian Day, Swacch Bharat Mission, Flood Relief, Swachata Pakhwada, Gandhi Jayanti, Rastriya Ekta Divas, Socio-Economic Survey in the adopted village etc. A few teachers took classes in other nearby schools under the programme "Maitree Ek Gyan Yatra". Besides these the college organizes various career counseling programmes and speeches on different topics to make the students aware about their duties and responsibilities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The area of the college campus is 1.86 acres and it has another area of 4.33 acres of land nearby which is proposed for college hostel and playground. It has five separate two-storey RCC buildings and an Assam Type room. There are sufficient numbers of classrooms having teacher's platform, facilities of electricity, black and green boards and adequate numbers of desks and benches. A few of the classrooms are also digitalized with LCD projectors. The whole campus, the library, a few examination controlling rooms and the examination halls are under CCTV surveillance. The internet and Wi-Fi facilities are provided to the students and teachers within the college campus. The college mainly runs by electric power along with a 25 KVA power generator to manage with any interruption. The library is being digitalized using computer software "SOUL - Version 2.0" and the building has got separate room for the librarian and reading rooms for teachers and students. Total 6158 number of books are there as per Accession Register. Journals and newspapers are also available for the students. It has got a Book Depot and a Book Bank that provide free text books to the poor students for the whole semester. The Library is equipped with three computers, one laptop, one server, one xerox machine one printer, one barcode scanner, one printer for the help of the students. The college has also got a central computer laboratory with 13 numbers of computers and one of them is connected with internet. A Notice Board serves the students all academic information and the College Magazine and the Wall Magazines provide them extra knowledge and scope of publishing their creative thoughts.

Student Support and Progression

The college provides free admission to the economically backward students as per the norms of State Government. Moreover, there is a Poor Students' Welfare Fund for financial support to the poor but meritorious students. Students also get scholarship from Ishan Uday, State Government etc.

Various programmes like career counseling, personality development etc. are organized in the college. International Yoga Day, World Health Day, No Tobacco Day etc. are also observed in the college for the benefit of the students. Many students of the college have qualified different competitive examinations. Many students have joined Indian Defense Service.

The institution has various cells like Anti Ragging Cell, Grievance and Redressal Cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Cell etc. to ensure internal and external discipline and maintain good environment among the students. The NSS Unit takes part in various matters like cleanliness, environmental sustainability, community linkages with neighboring area and voluntary activities in the adopted village by the college.

The college has a Students' Union that performs various activities pertaining to inter college games and sports, cultural activities, college week, etc. A few students took part in inter university cricket competition representing the Dibrugarh University team. The cricket and football teams of the college take part in the inter college sports competition besides organizing Zone Cricket tournament under Dibrugarh University.

The students are provided every possible help for participating in various activities and competitions like seminars, debating, cultural programmes and games and sports. The alumni association of the college is active and takes part in developmental activities of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College is governed by the principles of participatory democracy, maintaining a hierarchical set up for smooth and effective functioning. The Governing Body (G.B.) is the apex body of management of the college. The Principal as well as the secretary of G.B. and the teaching staff work together for designing and implementation of plans and policies of the college approved in GB meeting.

Several committees are constructed with the faculty members by the Principal for overall management of admission, finance, academic co-ordination, examinations and development of infrastructural facilities, maintenance of discipline, co-curricular activities, extension activities and maintenance of healthy campus in the college. The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell to take appropriate redressal measures and promote the environment of education in the college campus. A disciplinary committee is set up with teacher members to maintain a cordial academic ambience. Besides, the college has also an Anti-Ragging Committee to curb the menace of ragging in the college.

The college maintains different funds namely college development, examination, electricity, games, festivals, library, etc. The college has a construction committee that performs and looks into the developmental activities by using college development fund, financial grants received from Govt. of Assam and UGC. The GB also takes accounts of the expenditure made by the college for various activities. The use of accounts are checked and audited by internal and external auditors. The IQAC of the college has been playing a major role regarding quality assurance and improvement in the activities of the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college organizes various awareness programmes such as seminar, eco-camp, environmental awareness programme, career counseling, mental health and hygiene etc. for the students from time to time. It also celebrates and observes various Days like Republic Day, Independence Day, Voters' Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Teachers' Day, National Unity Day, International Environment Day, International Women Day etc.

For creating good environment the college uses Garbage Bin to collect the solid waste and provides access to safe sanitation system. It promotes appropriate management and disposal of domestic waste water through proper drainage system. The main source of energy of the college is electricity, power generator and solar energy. The college always tries to reduce the consumption of energy by using LED bulbs and solar energy. The college has created some cells like Sonari Commerce College Environmental Group, Social Welfare Group etc. to look into these matters.

For financial transparency the college does maximum cashless transactions through cheque and online payments. Transactions for admission and form fill up are done through bank.

	Commerce education, has always strived for a
	multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach in its

academic and co-curricular activities to achieve the goals as per the mission and vision of the institution. The College at present maintains its multidisciplinary nature by offering education of both commerce and arts streams. In its academic activities, students learn multidisciplinary courses like Environment Science, Mathematics, Gender Studies, and Human Rights etc. In its co-curricular activities also the college ensures a multidisciplinary approach. It regularly organizes workshops, popular talks, webinars, seminars and training programs on multidisciplinary themes. The present CBCS program of studies also allows the students to choose subjects from different disciplines as well as projects in interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary mode by formulating teams from different courses. Students are also encouraged to involve in community extension activities in their locality and the adopted villages of the college to exchange their knowledge with various stakeholders of the institution on issues like gender equity, women empowerment and education, health and hygiene etc. Hence, Sonari Commerce College has a legacy of multidisciplinary approach towards its academic and co-curricular activities. It has adopted a Perspective Plan and a Teaching Learning and Evaluation Policy to promote a multidisciplinary learning approach. It has also decided to adopt a revised perspective by implementing NEP, 2020 in near future.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

2. Academic Bank of Credit: The Sonari Commerce College is presently running the CBCS program, a flexible learning system, under The Dibrugarh University promoting accessibility, openness and fluidity in the educational system. Lately the college is preparing to introduce the New Education Policy, 2020 and the students will be able to take the advantage of a seamless Academic Bank of Credit process with its implementation in near future. Being an affiliated college under Dibrugarh University, the College follows the rules and regulations framed by the affiliating University from time to time. As such, the college has neither registered at NAD nor at Academic Bank of Credits. However, the college appreciates and welcomes the concept of the ABC and wishes to adopt the same in coming years as per NEP 2020.

3. Skill development:

3. Skill Development: Besides teaching the prescribed program of its affiliated University, Sonari

Commerce College has been organizing several activities to promote skills among its students and various stakeholders. A few Skill Enhancement Courses are part of its academic transaction. The College also offers skill based certificate courses to its students as add-on courses in order to equip the students with more employability. It, moreover, organizes workshops on skill development activities for both students and guardians. It also organizes different training programs for the neighboring people to develop their entrepreneurial skills. Moreover it is planning to implement a number of vocational courses in near future keeping in view the value of career- and vocational oriented education for the self-employment of the students. Different facets of skill development are being planned to be provided further by more add-on courses on Travel and Tourism Management, Marketing Management, Basic Accounting Procedure, Performing Art, Basic Computer Application and so on. Besides, the college has adopted five villages and is regularly conducting various skill development programs for the upliftment of their day to day life.

- 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course): Sonari Commerce College has integrated the Indian Knowledge system in its Teaching Learning process. It offers courses both in Assamese and English medium. The course contents cover ancient knowledge system such as philosophy, culture, ethical and moral values. Sonari Commerce College has organized several activities promoting the Indian Knowledge System. It has organized workshop on Indian Culture, Art and Craft etc. It organized webinar on importance of yoga, India's great culture and heritage. The college organizes traditional games, folk music and dance competition, poetry and recitation competition, etc. among the students which promote Indian Knowledge system. Sonari Commerce College is also ready to promote the Indian Knowledge System using modern technology and tools. It has subscription of eresources, smart-classroom facilities, ICT based classrooms, well equipped computer laboratory, etc. and these are used to promote the knowledge system of India. The college also has a library with adequate number of books, novels and magazines in both

	English and Assamese literature on different branches of Indian knowledge system like religion, art and culture. Thus, Sonari Commerce College has integrated the Indian Knowledge System.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Sonari Commerce College focuses on Outcome based education where both teachers and students are well aware of the course outcomes and all fully focus on achieving the intended outcomes. The students of the College take up courses with a certain goal of developing skills or gaining knowledge and they complete the goals by the end of the course. They are well oriented at the beginning of the session and are allowed to change their generic elective courses as per their interests. The faculty members of the College have developed various teaching learning contents such as Videos, PDF notes, etc., which are delivered to the students through WhatsApp groups. Hands-on training, workshops, popular talks, webinars, seminars, etc. on various topics are organized by the institution from time to time to achieve the intended learning objectives.
6. Distance education/online education:	Distance education/online education: Sonari Commerce College has a Distance Education centre under the Directorate of Open and Distance Learning (DODL), Dibrugarh University, as part of its academic extension services which is presently offering under graduate and post graduate courses. Presently there are more than two hundred students studying in this study centre. During the COVID-19 Pandemic Lockdown the College has successfully done course contents deliberation and evaluation in online mode. 1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Curricular Activity:

The college is affiliated to the Dibrugarh University. It follows the syllabus, academic calendar and other rules and regulations framed by the University. The college follows a planned curriculum delivery system. The college prospectus and lately college website contains all the necessary information related to college. The students going through the prospectus and visiting the website can know various course curriculum and facilities offered and followed by the college. The information related to admission, form filled-up, registration and examination etc. are notified in the college notice board. In the very beginning of session, the heads and faculty members of every department sit together and discuss on the curriculum and distribute the papers and topics to be taught in the session. On the basis of such allotment the teachers prepare their teaching plan. In this respect the departmental heads advise the teachers to prepare the plan giving sufficient time and keeping provision for revision after completion of the entire course. The students from slow learners group and other students are given special attention for clearing their doubts and other important questions as per their requirement. A monitoring system of the students is started in the very beginning of the classes. A well-planned class routine is followed for both odd and even semesters during each academic session. Additional and tutorial classes are also allotted in the class routine to enhance the students. The teachers also engage with the co-curricular activities like Games and Sports, educational tours to different sites and field study for practical experience of the students. Besides, they are involved in class seminars, group discussions, and evaluation of internal assessment for the overall development of the students. The sessional examinations and evaluation are conducted regularly as per the academic calendar of the university. The teachers maintain Teacher's Diary to record their day-to-day activities in the college. Regular meetings are held in the departments to know the status and progress of the curriculum. In the meeting important issues of the students are also discussed and necessary steps are taken to handle them. The records of these activities are kept properly in concerned departments for future requirement and are forwarded to the IQAC for official record.

A feedback system is going on in the college. Feedback is collected from the students of each semester in a regular manner. It enables the teachers to test the performance of the students.

Parents-teachers' meeting is organised from time to time to discuss the various aspects of curriculum delivery and their involvement into the college. The meeting discusses and try to find out the ways to create a better academic environment in the college. The college establishes a transparent mechanism for evaluating internal assessment in terms of frequency and mode. As mode of assessment there are provisions for internal assessment and final examination. The college follows all the rules for internal assessment for B. A. and B. Com programs formulated by the Dibrugarh University. The marks allotted for internal assessment (20%) in each course is based on the following:

- a. Sessional Examination-I (written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- b. Sessional Examination-II(written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment
- c. Seminar/Group Discussion: 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- d. Attendance: 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.

In-Sem and End-Sem examinations, seminar, group discussion are conducted on the dates as per academic calendar of Dibrugarh University and of the college. Marks secured in the sessional examinations are displayed in the departmental notice board for information of the students. Generally, the grievance redressal cell of the college tries to redress the grievances received from the students. The marks of the internal examinations are displayed in the departmental board for information of the students. Students usually do not express their grievances over the marks. However, if the principal receives any applications from student raising grievance regarding marks, he forwards it to the Grievance Redressal Cell. The Cell forwards it to the concerned Head of the Department to take necessary action. The course teacher deals with it to the student's satisfaction in transperant, time bound and efficient manner.

Grievances related to the End-Semester examination is settled at the affiliating University. The college authority forwards the grievance applications to the controller of examination of Dibrugarh University . 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

Response:

Response: The existing college campus is spread over an area of 0.75 acres of land. One more plot of the college, proposed for Boys' Hostel and playground, covers an area of 1.75 acres of land. It is funding with the grants and aids from UGC, Govt. of Assam, MLA's Local Area Development Fund, Local Donor Contribution, Tea Board of India and some extent by its own resources.

The institution has Eighteen 18 general classrooms, three digital classrooms, one computer laboratory and one conference room in the college. The classrooms of the college are well facilitated with electricity, fans, black and green boards, projectors and adequate numbers of desks and benches. The entire college campus including examination confidential room, examination halls, some classrooms, and the library are under the CCTV surveillance. Besides, there are Wi-Fi facilities for virtual connecting in the college.

The college has a library with a large number of books, photocopy facilities and reading room for both teachers and students. It is being operated manually at present and the Soul-0.2 has already been installed for digitalization. Now Computer accessioning and bar coding activities are under process.

The college has Girls' and Boys' Common Rooms, Students' Union Office, NSS Unit, one Power Generator Set, a Canteen cum Guest House (which is under construction), safe drinking water facilities etc. Three solar stand lights are installed in the campus. For extra curricula activities the facilities of sports, outdoor and indoor games NSS, cultural activities, public speaking are available in the institution.

There is a Seminar Hall in the college. The cultural functions and other programs are generally held here. The college has 25 KVA power generator and three phase electricity connection. The ONGC has provided the college a safe drinking water facility for the students using modern purifiers. The institution has separate room for IQAC.

The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoors and outdoors) cultural activities and yoga centre etc.

For all round development of the students the college encourages them to engage in co-curricular activities. The college organizes college week programs every year where different competitions are held under sports, literature and cultural sections. Equipments are available in the college for various indoors and outdoors game. The students are encouraged to participate in various competitions at university, district and state level. The Sonari Commerce College Library is a heart and soul part of the Institution since its inception in 1991. In the very beginning it was started with very limited books that were collected either from donation of well-wishers or by purchasing the most needed text books by the college. At present it is renovated with adequate numbers of books for the students. It is working on SOUL-2.0 software which is Integrated Library Management System (ILMS). The major module of SOUL which is catalogued and circulations are partially automated. The automation process includes sectional bar code which is under process.

There are more than 6000 (Six Thousand) books and 6 (six) periodicals in the college library. The data base of books has been created by using the SOUL 2.0 software in more than 4000 books and the process is going on.

The college library has got three big rare books (manuscript) approximately of 200 pages (published in

handwritten form in 1800 Saka.) which is preserved in the Museum Cum Cultural & Community Corner in the Library.the cultural corner of the college has also got a 'Dola' a particular carriage of brides in ancient time .The collected rare books are scanned and kept in the computer. The college library, moreover, provides the students question banks and question papers of previous examinations.

Very recently the sonari Commerce College Library subscribes for the e-resources by NLIST and NDLI. At present the library uses both computerized and manual system in issue and return of books supervised by some rules and regulations.

All the committees are headed by a convener who convenes meetings with other members to execute plan and strategies and communicated to the principal.

The principal, the head of the institution provides active leadership. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Response: The college generates fund from the fees collected under different heads from the students at the time of admission and the same is utilized for college development, campus maintenance, classroom maintenance, electricity duties etc. Besides fees from students, the college receives grants from the State Government, University Grant Commission and MLA and MP Local Area Development (LAD) Schemes.

The college has a Construction and Purchasing Committee that monitors the use of funds received from Government, UGC and other sources. The accounts related to the use of funds are recorded and kept by the office which is monitored strictly by the Principal. The principal has to submit the accounts at the GB meeting for approval. The fund utilization along with other financial matters is audited by a qualified CA Farm.

The college has an efficient financial management and control system to manage its day to day financial activities. Procurement and proper utilization of funds is ensured through some measures like:

- 1. A budget is prepared for every financial year and approved in the GB meeting. The body examines the financial requirement of each head and accordingly allocation is made.
- 2. Fee structure is formulated by the college annually with the approval of GB. The students deposit the fee in the respective bank directly.
- 3. All payments are made by cheque or by NEFT by the Principal as well as the Drawing and Disbursing Office (DDO) of the college subject to the approval of the GB. However, in unavoidable circumstances each payments are also made by observing proper ,norms of payment.
- 4. In case of heavy purchase, quotations are invited from proper farms and all tender procedures are followed to supply the quoted materials.

All respective accounts are audited by an Internal Auditor. The Internal Auditor, a Chartered Accountant (CA) is appointed by the GB of the college after completion of a financial year. Generally the audit is done at a convenient time or as required.

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

Two Best Practices successfully implemented by Sonari Commerce Coollege are: Poor Students' Welfare Fund and Tobacco Free Campus. They are described in the following way.

Best Practice No:1

Title of the practice: Poor Students' Welfare Fund.

Objectives of the Practice:

- (i) To provide financial assistance to economically backward but meritorious students.
- (ii) To create interest among the economically backward students towards higher education.
- (iii) To avoid drop out students for higher education.
- (iv) To enable economically backward students to fulfill their dream through education.

The context: In our society, there is wide economic disparity. Therefore, there is a need for equal educational opportunities. The institution believes in social responsibility. So it provides financial assistance to meritorious students from poor economic backgrounds, by creating a 'Poor Students' Welfare Fund'. Recently, the institution has established a book bank, named as "Poor Students' Book Bank" under this practice. The college provides books to the needy students for the whole session or semester from this Book Bank.

The practice: The College provides this holy service to the poor but meritorious students which really help them to complete their higher education. The institution expects that they will help to improve the society.

Best Practice No: 2

Title of the practice: Tobacco Free Campus

Goals:

- (i) To aware the students of the college and the nearby people of the harm of using tobacco in any form.
- (ii) To make the college campus clean and tobacco free.

(iii) To save the young generation from the grip of any toxin.

The context: The practice is undertaken by the college with the help of local govt. authority.

The Practice: Students of the college hail from different casts and communities. Some new comers are seen using packet products having tobacco. As soon as it is detected, they are aware of the harm of tobacco to human body and mind. With the help of the teaching staff, NSS unit, Students' Union etc. the college takes various steps like holding meetings with the students, holding health caring workshops with the help of govt. health organizations, postering against the use of tobacco etc. to make the college campus tobacco free.

Evidence of Success: The College has succeeded to make its campus free of tobacco. Students and any other employee of the college do not use tobacco in any form in the college campus. Having noticed the successful application of the practice in the college, the District Tobacco Control Cell, Charaideo, Assam has awarded the college a Tobacco Free Appreciation Certificate on 26th January, 2023 on the occasion of celebration of the 74th Republic Day of the country.
